## **JUDGE'S COMMENTS**

This poem makes a worthwhile statement about the challenges of the artistic process. What roadblocks do we put in our own way? But to enable us to feel the dancer's struggle, we need much more concreteness. Use the language of dance. If you don't know what that is, find out by talking to a dancer, or choose another art form where you know the language. Alliteration is one of the tools available to a poet, but like all tools, it can be over-used. Here, there are too many "d" words.
